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Background

Proposal 61

- Native to Australia
- Little impact on Alaska indigenous species
 - Unlikely to survive in the wild
 - Little disease transmission concern
- Farmed for food, leather, oil; and kept as pets
- Least concern conservation status

Proposal 238

- Results of intentional breeding between Carpathian grey wolf and German Shepard in 1955
- Possession currently prohibited by 5 AAC 92.030 Possession of wolf and wild cat hybrids

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Background

Proposal 238

- Breed used in border patrol, search and rescue, tracking, herding, hunting, etc. These dogs need a job.
- Temperament descriptions vary from trainable and friendly to family unit, to difficult juvenile years when hunting instincts present.
- A 2015 DNA study found 11-12% wolf ancestry in the breed

Current regulations (5 AAC 92.029) allow for the possession of all swine species (*Sus scrofa* var.).

Proposal was submitted as an ACR after the department was contacted about importing Russian boar for hunting.

- Disease transmission

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Proposal 144

5 AAC 92.029 allows cats (*Felis catus*) to be possessed without a permit and prohibits them from being released into the wild.

Trap, Neuter, Release (TNR) Programs

- Currently, anyone can trap and neuter feral cats throughout Alaska.
- Proponents of TNR programs argue they programs work: they are cost efficient, sustainable, and a humane alternative to trap/euthanize.
- These programs increase the number of neutered cats in a given area. TNRs decrease the number of unwanted litters, thereby reducing the shelter and animal control costs, and they increase the vaccination rates of cats.

Proposal 144

Trap, Neuter, Release (TNR) Programs

- Study results-71%-94% of population must be neutered/spayed to be effective
- Disease vector to wildlife and humans
- Vaccination boosters required over the life of cat
- Threat to wildlife

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Proposal 144

Exempt sterilized community cats from the list of species prohibited from being released into the wild.

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Proposal 145

Classify cats (*Felis catus*) as deleterious exotic wildlife and prohibit their release into the wild, feeding, and maintaining unconfined populations.

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Proposal 145

Proposal asks for several regulatory changes concerning cats:

5 AAC 92.029 Add language specifically prohibiting the release of domestic cats; prohibit possessing unconfined population, or individual cats, in a TNR program; prohibit maintaining unconfined/unrestrained cats on public or private property.

5 AAC 92.230 Prohibit the feeding of unconfined cats; prohibit placing cats with organizations practicing "no kill" management.

5 AAC 92.990 Classify all cats as deleterious wildlife.

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Proposal 145

5 AAC 92.029 allows cats (*Felis catus*) to be possessed without a permit and prohibits them from being released into the wild.

Definition of game (AS 16.05.940) includes feral domestic animals. Deleterious exotic wildlife is defined

Feral cats are classified as unclassified game

- Limited open season and bag limits

Cats are not defined as deleterious exotic wildlife

- No closed season & no bag limit

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Proposal 145

By classifying cats as deleterious exotic wildlife:

- Illegal to feed deleterious wildlife
- Domestic cats could stay on clean list (e.g., ferrets)
 - No permit needed
- No impact to placing cats with TNR programs
- No Change to places cats can be maintained
 - Department lacks authority to regulate disposition of legally owned cats, and where a person keeps or maintains legally owned cats

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Proposal 145

- As provided in 5 AAC 92.029, domestic cats cannot be released to the wild currently.
- Control programs (TNRs) show mixed results
- Threat to wildlife species
- Disease vector to wildlife and humans

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
